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Executive Summary

The purpose of coordination between human services and public transit coordination is to improve transportation services for all, but with special focus on persons with disabilities, older adults, and individuals with low incomes. Beyond fulfilling federal requirements, this planning process encouraged representatives of diverse organizations to join together in articulating specific projects that could advance transportation services in Region 7W/St. Cloud APO.

The Region 7W is located fifty miles northwest of the Twin Cities in Central Minnesota and includes the counties of Benton, Sherburne, Stearns and Wright. The St. Cloud Area Planning Organization (APO) is a designated metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for the area and is located entirely within the Region 7W. The Region includes large urban centers, such as St. Cloud, and also low density rural areas. The total population of Region 7W, including the St. Cloud Metropolitan Area, was 402,292 according to the 2010 Census.

The transportation providers in the Region 7W/St. Cloud APO are diverse and include public transit, volunteer driver programs, specialized transportation services, taxis, and private providers. Transportation services are provided by various agencies serving their clients including county social services, county public health, county veteran's services and agencies severing the elderly and disabled.

Region 7W worked together with the St. Cloud APO in developing this plan to coordinate transit services offered by public transit providers, human service agencies or private providers. A project steering committee analyzed the status of the 2011 Region 7W/St. Cloud APO Local Human Service Public Transit Coordination plan provided direction in the development of this plan update.

In January/February 2017, Region 7W/St. Cloud APO developed an inventory meant to capture service information for all public, private, school district, human service, and non-profit transportation providers in the region. Human service and private providers also worked with their riders to complete surveys meant to assist in the evaluation of the unmet transportation needs of human service agency clients. In addition to the survey data collection efforts, three focus group meetings (one for providers and two for consumers) were held for participants to discuss their current perceptions of transportation services, opportunities, short and longer-term needs, trends and challenges.

A Planning Workshop was held on May 8th 2017, which brought together 42 transportation stakeholders to identify issues and barriers to meeting the transportation needs and brainstorm potential strategies and projects that could meet those needs.

Throughout the planning process, many needs and gaps were discussed and possible solutions identified in the strategy prioritization and project idea process. Many of these needs and gaps could be further refined through participation in a Regional Transportation Coordinating Council. Convening a regional coordination body through

this planning process assisted in identifying issues and possible solutions, but a coordinating group working to implement projects would help ensure projects are completed. Centralizing information, staffing a mobility manager position, and marketing transit assets in the region could help improve the conditions of nearly all of the gaps and needs identified in this process.

Priority strategies for the Region 7W/St. Cloud APO area were grouped into three categories, including Coordinate and Consolidate Transportation Services and Resources; Mobility; and Communication, Training, and Organizational Support. The projects and strategies from the planning workshop were then evaluated by the Steering Committee for how much effort each project idea would take as well as how much impact each project could have in the region.

Difficult to do/Minor impact projects

- Improve transportation services at senior housing centers (ex. Keller Lake Commons).
- Educate regional professionals of transportation options.
- Increase availability of smart phone applications for trip planning.
- Increase service hours during non-typical travel times.
- Coordinate volunteer driver programs/organize volunteers to provide rides.
- Work with area schools/colleges to help coordinate mobility strategies and transportation services.
- Work with Uber/Lyft, and others to help improve fee/fare structures.

Difficult to do/Major impact projects

- Create a centralized database of available transportation resources.
- Hire a mobility manager.
- Create public awareness campaign to educate the public.
- Increase service hours throughout the day.
- Increase travel options to county seats.
- Expand weekend and holiday hours.
- Expand services in St. Cloud Metro outer lying area.
- Collect ride denials from private transportation partners.

Easy to do/Minor impact projects

- Improve community engagement activities.
- Continue/expand customer travel training programs.
- Provide technical training for coordination staff.
- Improve school access for children at the Salvation Army in St. Cloud.
- Job access for veterans.
- Improve private sector involvement through full participation of private enterprise participation.
- Contact between agencies with set base prices.

Easy to do/Major impact projects

- Contract with common carrier to permit co-mingling of capital resources.
- Convene regional coordination body.

Introduction

The goal of transit coordination is to enhance transportation access by minimizing duplication of services and facilitating the most appropriate and cost-effective transportation possible with available resources. The purpose of coordination between human services and public transit coordination is to improve transportation services for all, but with special focus on persons with disabilities, older adults, and individuals with low incomes. By coordinating communities can maximize use of transportation resources funded through public and private sources.

This document is an update of the 2011 Local Human Service Transit Coordination Plan and will assist stakeholders, such as Regional Transportation Coordinating Councils, as they determine ways to coordinate human service transportation and transit services in Region 7W/St. Cloud APO. The 2016 Local Human Service Transit Coordination Plan documents technical analysis that evaluates existing transportation services in Region 7W/St. Cloud APO and assesses needs and gaps of transportation service provision among public transit agencies, social service agencies, and other providers. The plan also records public participation efforts and stakeholders' preferred strategies and projects to improve transportation coordination in Region 7W/St. Cloud APO.

A Local Human Services Transit Coordination plan is a federal requirement under the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act). Federal regulations state that projects eligible for funding under the Transportation for Elderly Persons and Persons with Disabilities (Section 5310) program must advance strategies identified in a Local Human Service Transit Coordination Plan. This planning process fulfills federal requirements by engaging transportation providers, social services agencies, and members of the public in identifying strategies for regional transportation coordination.

Beyond fulfilling federal requirements, this planning process encouraged representatives of diverse organizations to join together in articulating specific projects that could advance transportation services in Region 7W/St. Cloud APO. Through public participation activities, stakeholders brainstormed project ideas and refined these ideas in a collaborative setting. The final project list reflects input from a broad range of regional stakeholders and provides a 5-year blueprint for future coordination efforts in Region 7W/St. Cloud APO.


Existing Conditions

Geography

The Region 7W is located fifty miles northwest of the Twin Cities in Central Minnesota and includes the counties of Benton, Sherburne, Stearns and Wright. The St. Cloud Area Planning Organization (APO) is a designated metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for the area and is located entirely within the Region 7W.

St. Cloud is the largest city in the region and serves as a primary trade center within and outside the region. County seat cities in the region such as Foley (Benton County), Elk River (Sherburne County), St. Cloud (Stearns County), and Buffalo (Wright County) are larger centers and key destinations with other urban centers existing throughout the region. The region also includes low density rural areas, which can serve as a geographic barrier to transportation. The proximity of the region to the Twin Cities is one of the attractions to living there and is a frequent destination for a variety of trips.

According to the 2010 Census, the region's population is 402,292. There are fourteen state aid cities (population over 5,000) accounting for 54% of the region's population with 216,692. The population living in smaller cities or townships accounts for 46% of the region's population with 185,600.



Demographics

To better understand the relationship between regional demographics, transportation options, and key destinations, a series of maps was created depicting these elements in this region. These are included in Appendix A.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the 2015 population in Region 7W was 417,434 people, which accounts for 7.6 percent of the state's total population. The region experienced rapid growth between 1950 and 2010 by adding approximately 277,000 residents. From 2010 to 2015, the region saw a 30 percent population increase that makes it the fastest growing of the 13 regions in the state.

The Transit Dependency Index created for the Greater Minnesota Transit Investment plan presents concentrations of populations by census tract with the potential for higher public transportation needs based on population density, employment density, under age 18 density, over age 65 density, density of households with zero vehicles, density of population with a disability, density of population with limited English language ability, and density of population in poverty. The map presented in Appendix A shows pockets of areas with a higher likelihood of needing transit. The most prevalent is the St. Cloud metropolitan area in Stearns, Benton and a small portion in Sherburne counties. This area is served with public transit by the St. Cloud Metro Bus. Other areas with moderate densities include the western portion of Stearns County near Sauk Centre and Buffalo in Wright County. Areas with low to moderate dependency scores include most smaller urban cities throughout the region such as Albany, Cold Spring, Foley, Paynesville, Princeton/Zimmerman, St. Michael, the cities along Interstate 94 and US 10 in Sherburne and Wright counties and the cities along US 12 in Wright county.

The region's population is generally younger than the rest of the state with more people aged 25 years and younger and between 25 and 54 years of age and a smaller percentage of people over the age of 55. The number of young families moving into the region has quickly increased its number of young residents, but the size of the Baby Boom generation has also increased the number of residents aged 45 and older. The maps found in Appendix A show high densities of population age 18 and younger in the south and east portions of Sherburne and Wright counties and higher densities of population age 65 and older in rural Stearns county, St. Cloud area, and Buffalo. Older adults and youth represent higher demand for transit as they may be without a driver's license, have access to their own vehicle, or less willing to drive.

According to the State Demographic Center, Region 7W is expected to gain about 80,000 net new residents from 2015 to 2035, which is an increase of 18.2 percent while the State is projected to grow 10.8 percent. Despite the region's younger population, much of the demographic growth is expected to be in the older age groups.

Region 7W's population is less diverse than the rest of the state. Most of the minority population and population with a limited English language ability reside in the St. Cloud metropolitan area, with some pockets throughout the region. Limited English proficiency can be an indicator of a household's relative dependency on transit. These maps can be found in Appendix A.

The density of population with a disability appears to be lower than the rest of the state. Persons with disabilities are often heavily dependent of public transit services. The population of people with disabilities analyzed in this process includes more than those with ambulatory or other disabilities preventing use of operating a personal motor vehicle. The map found in Appendix A shows the density of population with disabilities.

A map found in Appendix A shows poverty population density in the region. Highest densities are found in the St. Cloud metropolitan area. A map in Appendix A shows density of no-vehicle households. Higher densities are found in the St. Cloud metropolitan area with the highest density in the region near the St. Cloud State University. Other pockets are found throughout the region, but primarily in the smaller urban cities. Access to a car is one of the most influential indicators of transit need and may represent those without the economic ability of owning a vehicle, those who chose not to own a car or who are unable to drive like senior citizens and people with certain disabilities.

Region 7W is a net labor exporter by having more workers than available jobs according to commuting data from the U.S. Census Bureau. St. Cloud is the largest employment center in the region and attracts work from inside the region and outer counties. Benton, Sherburne, and Wright counties show labor outflows with residents traveling to the Twin Cities metro and St. Cloud.

According to the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development's (DEED) Cost of Living tool, the basic needs budget for an average Minnesota family (2 adults and 1 child, with 1 full-time and 1 part-time worker) was \$54,804 in 2016. The cost of living for a similar family in Region 7W as \$52,404, which is third highest of the 13 regions in the state behind the Twin Cities metro and Region 7E. The highest monthly costs are similar to the rest of the state with transportation, food, and housing.

Transportation Resources

Throughout 2017, Region 7W/St. Cloud APO developed an inventory meant to capture service information for all public, private, school district, human service, and non-profit transportation providers in the region. The inventory provides a source of comparison across agencies and a means to identify service gaps. To complete the inventory, Region 7W sent an online questionnaire to 194 of the region's transportation providers, possible transportation providers, and human service providers. Fifteen responses were returned. A summary of the transportation and human service resources is available in Appendix B.

Public transit providers in Region 7W/St. Cloud APO include the following systems:

• Metro Bus is the primary public transit service in the St. Cloud metro area with service included in the cities of Sartell, Sauk Rapids, St. Cloud and Waite Park in the counties of Benton, Sherburne and Stearns. Metro Bus's services include fixed route and Dial-a-Ride transport seven days a week and includes the Northstar Link that provides bus service to the Northstar Commuter Rail in Big Lake.

- Trailblazer Transit provides service in Wright County through cities in the county forming the Wright County Area Transit (WCAT) after the disbanding of River Rider. Service includes all of Wright County and Trailblazer also includes McLeod and Sibley counties.
- Tri-CAP is a public service that provides transportation in Benton, Morrison, Stearns, and Sherburne counties and service five days per week in the cities of Albany, Sauk Centre, Melrose, Paynesville, Little Falls, Big Lake and Elk River.

Region 7W/St. Cloud APO also has five private non-profit transportation providers that have Section 5310 vehicles, including: City of Delano, Functional Industries, Guardian Angels of Elk River, Independence Center Inc., Options Inc., and WACOSA.

Transportation services are provided in the region by various agencies from within and outside the region. Client based needs are addressed through non-profit human services, for-profit human services, government entities, and for-profit transportation companies. For example, Jefferson Lines operates a line through the heart of Region 7W along Interstate 94 with a primary transfer point in St. Cloud and a college connection at St. Cloud State University.

Travel pattern data collected from this process and the Greater Minnesota Transit Investment Plan indicate a lot of travel through the region (primarily to the south), travel into the region (primarily to St. Cloud), and cross county travel within and outside the region. Origin/destination mapping conducted by MnDOT appears to follow the geographic distribution of the population throughout the region. Destinations in this map tend to be within the higher population centers, shown as Origins/Home, in the region or in cities along major highways.

Response themes from the organization questionnaire show that most coordination in the region is being done with the public transit providers. Responses indicate that the following changes could improve coordination:

- Create cross agency collaboration with the Department of Human Services and counties to improve billing
- Allowing public transit to cross county lines
- Expanding hours of service and area
- Improving resources for rider referrals

When questionnaire respondents were asked what issues have you encountered in coordinating or attempting to coordinate services, the following barriers were ranked in order of greatest concern:

- 1. Cost
- 2. Scheduling conflicts
- 3. Staff time requirements
- 4. Limited serve area boundaries
- 5. Billing and payment

- 6. Limited service hour availability
- 7. Driver qualifications
- 8. Insurance
- 9. Passenger security

Public Participation

Steering Committee

The plan Steering Committee closely guided plan decision-making. Steering Committee duties included:

- Evaluating strategies and assessing outcomes of projects identified in the 2011 Local Human Service Transit Coordination Plan
- Developing project ideas and identifying priority strategies as part of the public workshop
- Prioritizing project ideas identified at the public workshop for inclusion in the final plan

2011 Local Human Service Transit Coordination Plan Outcomes

Another component of the existing conditions is an analysis of the 2011 Local Human Service Transit Coordination Plan's list of strategies and projects for improving transit coordination. The 2016 Steering Committee reviewed these strategies and projects to assess regional progress on transit coordination since 2011. The group also identified causes for success and barriers to action regarding project implementation. The complete list of 2011 strategies and projects and an assessment of their outcome is presented below.

Rider Survey

On-line and paper copy surveys were made available to human service and private providers of transportation between January 23, 2017 and February 10, 2017. Approximately two-hundred agencies were asked to work with their clients to complete the survey that is used to evaluate the unmet transportation needs of human service agency clients. Returned surveys and followed discussions indicated that transportation services vary based location and individuals have unique travel needs. Public transit providers were not asked to complete rider surveys as they completed them last year for the Greater Minnesota Transit Investment Plan. Rider survey information from the public transit providers was used in the development of this plan.

Focus Group

In addition to the survey data collection, focus group meetings (one for providers and two for consumers) were held for participants to discuss their current perceptions of transportation services, opportunities, short and longer-term needs, trends and challenges. On February 8, 2017, the organization and first rider focus group meetings were held in

St. Cloud. Nineteen participants from public transit, non-profit human service, non-profit transportation, and for-profit transportation attended the organization focus group meeting. The focus group discussed driver and worker shortages, current challenges for operators to leave their region, accommodating special requests/accommodations, challenges for people to get to the bus, and a general lack of awareness of the transportation services that are available. Public attendance was very limited at the rider focus group meeting on February 8, 2017 and the second rider focus group meeting on February 9, 2017 at the Monticello Community Center.

Planning Workshop


The planning workshop was held at the St. Cloud library on May 8, 2017 incorporated input from all interested stakeholders. A total of 42 people attended, listed in Appendix C. At the workshop, stakeholders identified strengths and weaknesses of transit coordination in the region. Building from these, stakeholders then identified priority strategies for transit coordination and brainstormed project ideas that could address these strategies. Using input gathered at this workshop, the Steering Committee prioritized the strategies and projects included in the final plan. A complete list of project ideas considered during the planning process is presented in Appendix D.



Strengths and Weaknesses

At the public workshop, participants identified strengths and weaknesses of existing coordination efforts in Region 7W. In a word cloud, participants were asked to name three strengths and weaknesses that were then displayed on the screen. Participants then discussed the strengths and weaknesses to determine if anything was missing or needing additional clarification. Combined with the plan's technical findings, the strengths and

weaknesses helped form the basis for identifying strategies to address transportation coordination in this region.





Needs Assessment

The Steering Committee and Workshop attendees discussed needs and gaps in the region throughout the planning process. They were grouped into seven categories: service limitations, gaps & unmet needs, centralize information, spatial limitations, temporal limitations, program eligibility and trip purpose limitations, and service quality and miscellaneous issues.

• Service Limitations, Gaps & Unmet Needs

- o Services in rural areas is lacking and trips to the county seat are important.
- o There are not enough vehicles and capacity to handle the demand.
- o Mobility manager position could further assist in identifying and resolving limitations, gaps and unmet needs in the region.
- o Getting to the bus stop can be challenging in some locations.
- o Attracting and maintaining good workers is a challenge. There is a shortage of volunteer, public, and private transportation service drivers.

Centralized Information

- o Many people are unaware of the public transit services that are available.
- A user friendly central location of available transportation services is needed for riders to plan their own trip and could serve as a better resource for referrals.
- o Existing call centers primarily focus on non-transportation related matters.
- Mobility manager position could assist directing riders to available services.

Spatial Limitations

- o Operating hours are an issue when rides leave the region.
- o Reimbursement issues with empty miles.
- O Difficult to find companies/drivers to provide medical rides to large cities outside the region.
- o Crossing county lines can cause challenges for some operators.

• Temporal Limitations


- o Service availability may be lacking for social trips.
- Limited hours and weekend services.
- o Schedules don't always match demand.
- Program Eligibility and Trip Purpose Limitations
 - Need to work with agencies such as WACOSA to wean people from para transit to traditional services when applicable.
 - o Providers can't pool passengers with different needs.
 - o Paratransit services may be overused with other services available.
- Service Quality and Miscellaneous Issues
 - o Some people may be reluctant or resistant to using transit.
 - o Marketing transit could help shift perception issues for potential riders.
 - o Traditional/regular riders get preference and special requests are sometimes difficult to coordinate.
 - O Volunteer drivers do not always know the extent of their trip and may experience possible or perceived risk in their transport.


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
Strategies and Projects

Strategies

To prioritize typical coordination strategies, workshop attendees voted on sub-strategies that would improve transit coordination in the region. The sub-strategies are grouped into three main categories: Coordinate and Consolidate Transportation Services and Resources; Mobility; and Communication, Training, and Organizational Support.







Projects

To categorize project ideas, Steering Committee members created an "Effort vs. Impact" chart to compare these project ideas. This created a relative sense of how much effort (low to high) each project idea would take as well as how much impact (minor to major) each project could have in its region. This chart can be found in Appendix E. The strategies and projects listed below represent those ideas the steering committee prioritized as having the most potential to improve transit coordination in Region 7W/St. Cloud APO.

Communication, Training, and Organizational Support

- Create a centralized database of available transportation resources.
- Hire a mobility manager.
- Create a public awareness campaign to educate the public.
- Convene regional coordination body.
- Improve community engagement activities.
- Educate regional professionals of transportation options.
- Provide technical training for coordination staff.
- Continue/expand customer travel training programs.
- Increase availability of smart phone applications for trip planning.

Mobility Strategies


- Work with area schools/colleges to help coordinate mobility strategies and transportation services.
- Improve job access for veterans.
- Improve school access for children, such as the Salvation Army in St. Cloud.
- Improve transportation services at senior housing centers, such as the Keller Lake Commons.

- Expand weekend and holiday hours.
- Increase travel options to county seats.
- Increase service hours throughout the day.
- Increase service hours during non-typical travel times.






Figure 21 Existing and Desired Travel Patterns






Transit Dependency Index - RDC 7W








